		1 TED SETTLEMENT, FRUITVALE and PATEL (6243)

1	IT IS HEREBY STIPULATED AND AGREED by and between the parties to the above-
2	entitled proceedings that the following matters are true:
3	PARTIES
4	1. Anne Sodergren (Complainant) is the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy
5	(Board). She brought this action solely in her official capacity and is represented in this matter by
6	Xavier Becerra, Attorney General of the State of California, by Laura Pedicini, Deputy Attorney
7	General.
8	2. Respondents Fruitvale Avenue Pharmacy, Inc. (Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy) and
9	Kalpesh Patel (Respondent Patel) are represented in this proceeding by attorney Natalia Mazina,
10	whose address is: 100 Pine Street, Suite 1250, San Francisco, CA 94111-5235
11	3. On or about July 8, 2015, the Board issued Original Permit No. PHY 53737 to
12	Respondent Fruitvale Avenue Pharmacy. The Original Permit was in full force and effect at all
13	times relevant to the charges brought here; it expired on July 1, 2018, and has not been renewed.
14	4. On or about September 25, 1996, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy License
15	Number RPH 49167 to Respondent Patel. The Pharmacist License was in full force and effect at
16	all times relevant to the charges brought here and will expire on May 31, 2022, unless renewed.
17	JURISDICTION
18	5. Accusation No. 6243 was filed before the Board, and is currently pending against
19	Respondents. The Accusation and all other statutorily required documents were properly served
20	on Respondents on May 13, 2019. Respondents timely filed their Notices of Defense contesting
21	the Accusation.
22	6. A copy of Accusation No. 6243 is attached as exhibit A and incorporated here by
23	reference.
24	ADVISEMENT AND WAIVERS
25	7. Respondents have carefully read, fully discussed with counsel, and understand the
26	charges and allegations in Accusation No. 6243. Respondents have also carefully read, fully
27	discussed with counsel, and understand the effects of this Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary
28	Order.

	STIPULATED SETTLEMENT, FRUITVALE and PATEL (6243)

8. Respondents are fully aware of their legal rights in this matter, including the right to a 1 hearing on the charges and allegations in the Accusation; the right to confront and cross-examine 2 the witnesses against them; the right to present evidence and to testify on their own behalf; the 3 right to the issuance of subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of 4 documents; the right to reconsideration and court review of an adverse decision; and all other 5 rights accorded by the California Administrative Procedure Act and other applicable laws. 6 9. Respondents voluntarily, knowingly, and intelligently waive and give up each and 7 every right set forth above. 8 CULPABILITY 9 10. Respondents understand and agree that the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 10 6243, if proven at a hearing, constitute cause for imposing discipline upon their respective 11 licenses and permits. 12 11. For the purpose of resolving the Accusation without the expense and uncertainty of 13 further proceedings, Respondent agrees that, at a hearing, Complainant could establish a factual 14 basis for the charges in the Accusation, and Respondents give up their right to contest those 15 charges. 16 12. Respondents agree that their Original Permit and Pharmacist Licenses, respectively, 17 are subject to discipline and they agree to be bound by the Board's probationary terms as set forth 18 in the Disciplinary Order below. 19 CONTINGENCY 20 This stipulation shall be subject to approval by the Board of Pharmacy. Respondents 21 13. understand and agree that counsel for Complainant and the staff of the Board of Pharmacy may 22 communicate directly with the Board regarding this stipulation and settlement, without notice to 23 24 or participation by Respondents or their counsel. By signing the stipulation, Respondents understand and agree that they may not withdraw their agreement or seek to rescind the 25 stipulation prior to the time the Board considers and acts upon it. If the Board fails to adopt this 26 stipulation as its Decision and Order, the Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order shall be of 27 no force or effect, except for this paragraph, it shall be inadmissible in any legal action between 28 3

the parties, and the Board shall not be disqualified from further action by having considered this
 matter.

3 14. The parties understand and agree that Portable Document Format (PDF) and facsimile
4 copies of this Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order, including PDF and facsimile
5 signatures thereto, shall have the same force and effect as the originals.

6 15. This Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order is intended by the parties to be an
7 integrated writing representing the complete, final, and exclusive embodiment of their agreement.
8 It supersedes any and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, discussions,
9 negotiations, and commitments (written or oral). This Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary
10 Order may not be altered, amended, modified, supplemented, or otherwise changed except by a
11 writing executed by an authorized representative of each of the parties.

12 16. In consideration of the foregoing admissions and stipulations, the parties agree that
13 the Board may, without further notice or formal proceeding, issue and enter the following
14 Disciplinary Order:

## **DISCIPLINARY ORDER**

# FRUITVALE AVENUE PHARMACY, INC. PHY 53737

17 IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Original Permit No. PHY 53737 issued to Respondent
18 Fruitvale Avenue Pharmacy Inc. is surrendered and accepted by the Board of Pharmacy.

The surrender of Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy's Original Permit No. PHY 53737
 and the acceptance of the surrendered Permit by the Board shall constitute the imposition of
 discipline imposed against Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy. This stipulation constitutes a record
 of discipline and shall become a part of Respondent's license history with the Board of Pharmacy.

23 2. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy shall lose all rights and privileges as a Pharmacy in
24 California as of the effective date of the Board's Decision and Order.

3. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy shall cause to be delivered to the Board any pocket
licenses and, if any were issued, any wall certificates related to Original Permit No. PHY 53737
on or before the effective date of the Decision and Order.

4. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy may only seek a new or reinstated license from the

Board by way of a new application for licensure. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy understands
and agrees that if they ever file an application for licensure or a petition for reinstatement in the
State of California, the Board shall treat it as a new application for licensure and it shall not be
eligible to petition for reinstatement of licensure. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy must comply
with all the laws, regulations and procedures for reinstatement of a revoked license in effect at the
time the petition is filed, and all the charges contained in Accusation No. 6243 shall be deemed to
be true, correct, and admitted by Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy.

5. Should Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy ever apply or reapply for a new license or
certification, or petition for reinstatement of a license, by any other health care licensing agency
in the State of California, all of the charges and allegations contained in Accusation No. 6243
shall be deemed to be true, correct, and admitted by Respondent for the purpose of any Statement
of Issues or any other proceeding seeking to deny or restrict licensure.

6. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy may not apply for any new license for the Board for
three (3) years from the effective date of the surrender. Respondent Fruitvale Pharmacy shall
meet all requirements applicable to the license sought as of the date the application for that
license is submitted to the Board.

# KALPESH PATEL RPH 49167

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Pharmacist License No. RPH 49167 issued to
Respondent Kalpesh Patel is revoked. However, the revocation is stayed and Respondent Patel is
placed on probation for two (2) years based on the following terms and conditions.

## **Obey All Laws**

Respondent shall obey all state and federal laws and regulations.

Respondent shall report any of the following occurrences to the Board, in writing, within
seventy- two (72) hours of such occurrence:

an arrest or issuance of a criminal complaint for violation of any provision of the
 Pharmacy Law, state and federal food and drug laws, or state and federal controlled
 substances laws

1	• a plea of guilty, or nolo contendere, no contest, or similar, in any state or federal
2	criminal proceeding to any criminal complaint, information or indictment
3	• a conviction of any crime
4	• the filing of a disciplinary pleading, issuance of a citation, or initiation of another
5	administrative action filed by any state or federal agency which involves
6	Respondent Kalpesh Patel's license or which is related to the practice of pharmacy
7	or the manufacturing, obtaining, handling, distributing, billing, or charging for any
8	drug, device or controlled substance
9	Failure to timely report such occurrence shall be considered a violation of probation.
10	2. <b>Report to the Board</b>
11	Respondent Patel shall report to the Board quarterly, on a schedule as directed by the Board
12	or its designee. The report shall be made either in person or in writing, as directed. Among other
13	requirements, Respondent Patel shall state in each report under penalty of perjury whether there
14	has been compliance with all the terms and conditions of probation.
15	Failure to submit timely reports in a form as directed shall be considered a violation of
16	probation. Any period(s) of delinquency in submission of reports as directed may be added to the
17	total period of probation. Moreover, if the final probation report is not made as directed,
18	probation shall be automatically extended until such time as the final report is made and accepted
19	by the Board.
20	3. Interview with the Board
21	Upon receipt of reasonable prior notice, Respondent Patel shall appear in person for
22	interviews with the Board or its designee, at such intervals and locations as are determined by the
23	Board or its designee. Failure to appear for any scheduled interview without prior notification to
24	Board staff, or failure to appear for two (2) or more scheduled interviews with the Board or its
25	designee during the period of probation, shall be considered a violation of probation.

### Cooperate with Board Staff

Respondent Patel shall cooperate with the Board's inspection program and with the Board's
monitoring and investigation of Respondent Patel's compliance with the terms and conditions of
his probation. Failure to cooperate shall be considered a violation of probation.

## **Continuing Education**

Respondent Patel shall provide evidence of efforts to maintain skill and knowledge as a pharmacist as directed by the Board or its designee.

## **Reporting of Employment and Notice to Employers**

9 During the period of probation, Respondent Patel shall notify all present and prospective
10 employers of the decision in case number 6243 and the terms, conditions and restrictions imposed
11 on Respondent by the decision, as follows:

Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, and within ten (10) days of 12 undertaking any new employment, Respondent Patel shall report to the Board in writing the 13 14 name, physical address, and mailing address of each of Entity employer(s), and the name(s) and telephone number(s) of all of Entity direct supervisor(s), as well as any pharmacist(s)-in- charge, 15 designated representative(s)-in-charge, responsible manager, or other compliance supervisor(s) 16 and the work schedule, if known. Respondent Patel shall also include the reason(s) for leaving 17 the prior employment. Respondent Patel shall sign and return to the Board a written consent 18 19 authorizing the Board or its designee to communicate with all of Respondent Patel's employer(s) and supervisor(s), and authorizing those employer(s) or supervisor(s) to communicate with the 2021 Board or its designee, concerning Respondent Patel's work status, performance, and monitoring. Failure to comply with the requirements or deadlines of this condition shall be considered a 22 violation of probation. 23

Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, and within fifteen (15) days of
Respondent Patel undertaking any new employment, Respondent Patel shall cause (a) Entity
direct supervisor, (b) Entity pharmacist-in-charge, designated representative-in-charge,
responsible manager, or other compliance supervisor, and (c) the owner or owner representative
of Entity employer, to report to the Board in writing acknowledging that the listed individual(s)

has/have read the decision in case number 6243, and terms and conditions imposed thereby. If 1 2 one person serves in more than one role described in (a), (b), or (c), the acknowledgment shall so state. It shall be Respondent Patel's responsibility to ensure that these acknowledgment(s) are 3 timely submitted to the Board. In the event of a change in the person(s) serving the role(s) 4 5 described in (a), (b), or (c) during the term of probation, Respondent Patel shall cause the person(s) taking over the role(s) to report to the Board in writing within fifteen (15) days of the 6 change acknowledging that he or she has read the decision in case number 6243, and the terms 7 8 and conditions imposed thereby.

9 If Respondent Patel works for or is employed by or through an employment service,
10 Respondent Patel must notify the person(s) described in (a), (b), and (c) above at every entity
11 licensed by the Board of the decision in case number 6243, and the terms and conditions imposed
12 thereby in advance of respondent commencing work at such licensed entity. A record of this
13 notification must be provided to the Board upon request.

14 Furthermore, within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, and within fifteen (15) days of Respondent Patel undertaking any new employment by or through an employment 15 service, Respondent Patel shall cause the person(s) described in (a), (b), and (c) above at the 16 employment service to report to the Board in writing acknowledging that he or she has read the 17 decision in case number, and the terms and conditions imposed thereby. It shall be Respondent 18 19 Patel's responsibility to ensure that these acknowledgment(s) are timely submitted to the Board. Failure to timely notify present or prospective employer(s) or failure to cause the identified 20 person(s) with that/those employer(s) to submit timely written acknowledgments to the Board 21 shall be considered a violation of probation. 22

"Employment" within the meaning of this provision includes any full-time, part-time,
temporary, relief, or employment/management service position as a pharmacist, or any position
for which a pharmacist is a requirement or criterion for employment, whether Respondent Patel is
an employee, independent contractor or volunteer.

7. Notification of Change(s) in Name, Address(es), or Phone Number(s) 1 Respondent Patel shall notify the Board in writing within ten (10) days of any change in 2 name, residence address, mailing address, e-mail address or phone number. 3 Failure to timely notify the Board of any change in employer, name, address, or phone 4 5 number shall be considered a violation of probation. 6 8. **Restrictions on Supervision and Oversight of Licensed Facilities** During the period of probation, Respondent Patel shall not supervise any intern pharmacist, 7 be the pharmacist-in-charge, designated representative-in-charge, responsible manager or other 8 9 compliance supervisor of any entity licensed by the Board, nor serve as a consultant. Assumption of any such unauthorized supervision responsibilities shall be considered a violation of probation. 10 11 9. **Reimbursement of Board Costs** As a condition precedent to successful completion of probation, Respondent Patel shall pay 12 to the Board its costs of investigation and prosecution in the amount of \$7,500.00. Respondent 13 14 Patel shall be permitted to pay these costs in a payment plan approved in writing by the Board or its designee. 15 There shall be no deviation from this schedule absent prior written approval by the Board or 16 its designee. Failure to pay costs by the deadline(s) as directed shall be considered a violation of 17 probation. 18 19 The filing of bankruptcy by Respondent Patel shall not relieve Respondent Patel of his responsibility to reimburse the Board its costs of investigations and prosecution. 20 21 10. **Probation Monitoring Costs** Respondent Patel shall pay any costs associated with probation monitoring as determined 22 by the Board each and every year of probation. Such costs shall be payable to the Board on a 23 24 schedule as directed by the Board or its designee. Failure to pay such costs by the deadline(s) as directed shall be considered a violation of probation. 25 /// 26 /// 27 28 /// 9

### 11. Status of License

Respondent Patel shall, at all times while on probation, maintain an active, current license
with the Board, including any period during which suspension or probation is tolled. Failure to
maintain an active, current license shall be considered a violation of probation.

If Respondent Patel's license expires or is cancelled by operation of law or otherwise at any
time during the period of probation, including any extensions thereof due to tolling or otherwise,
upon renewal or reapplication, Respondent Patel's license shall be subject to all terms and
conditions of this probation not previously satisfied.

#### 12. License Surrender While on Probation/Suspension

Following the effective date of this decision, should Respondent Patel cease practice due to 10 retirement or health, or be otherwise unable to satisfy the terms and conditions of probation, 11 Respondent Patel may tender his license to the Board for surrender. The Board or its designee 12 shall have the discretion whether to grant the request for surrender or take any other action it 13 14 deems appropriate and reasonable. Upon formal acceptance of the surrender of the license, Respondent Patel will no longer be subject to the terms and conditions of probation. This 15 surrender constitutes a record of discipline and shall become a part of Respondent Patel's license 16 history with the Board. 17

Upon acceptance of the surrender, Respondent Patel shall relinquish his pocket and wall
licenses to the Board within ten (10) days of notification by the Board that the surrender is
accepted. Respondent Patel may not reapply for any license from the Board for three (3) years
from the effective date of the surrender. Respondent Patel shall meet all requirements applicable
to the license sought as of the date the application for that license is submitted to the Board,
including any outstanding costs.

#### 13. Practice Requirement – Extension of Probation

Except during periods of suspension, Respondent Patel shall, at all times while on
probation, be employed as a pharmacist in California for a minimum of 40 hours per calendar
month. At least ten days in advance of each new quarter, Respondent Patel shall submit a
quarterly work schedule for approval to his assigned probation monitor. The work schedule shall

provide the dates and hours Respondent shall be employed as a pharmacist in California on a 1 2 monthly basis, sufficient to meet or exceed his 40 hour per calendar month requirement. Any month during which the 40 hour minimum is not met shall extend the period of probation by one 3 month. Moreover, Respondent Patel shall not deviate from his quarterly work schedule once it is 4 5 approved by his probation monitor. During any such period of insufficient employment, Respondent Patel must nonetheless comply with all terms and conditions of probation, unless 6 Respondent Patel receives a waiver in writing from the Board or its designee. Respondent Patel 7 8 understands and agrees that he may not satisfy the employment requirement through remote 9 employment in Puerto Rico. However, he may work for an Accountable Care Organization 10 (ACO) performing medication therapy management (MTM) and setting up drug adherence programs, as long as the work requires a pharmacist's license, and as long as Respondent Patel is 11 physically present in California while performing his duties. 12

If Respondent Patel does not practice as a pharmacist in California for the minimum 13 14 number of 40 hours in any calendar month, for any reason (including vacation), Respondent Patel shall notify the Board in writing within ten (10) days of the conclusion of that calendar month. 15 This notification shall include at least: the date(s), location(s), and hours of last practice; the 16 reason(s) for the interruption or reduction in practice; and the anticipated date(s) on which 17 Respondent Patel will resume practice at the required level. Respondent Patel shall further notify 18 19 the Board in writing within ten (10) days following the next calendar month during which Respondent Patel practices as a pharmacist in California for the minimum of hours. Any failure 2021 to timely provide such notification(s) shall be considered a violation of probation.

It is a violation of probation for Respondent Patel's probation to be extended pursuant to the provisions of this condition for a total period, counting consecutive and non-consecutive months, exceeding thirty-six (36) months. The Board or its designee may post a notice of the extended probation period on its website.

#### Violation of Probation

If Respondent Patel has not complied with any term or condition of probation, the Board shall have continuing jurisdiction over Respondent Patel, and probation shall be automatically extended, until all terms and conditions have been satisfied or the Board has taken other action as deemed appropriate to treat the failure to comply as a violation of probation, to terminate probation, and to impose the penalty that was stayed.

If Respondent Patel violates probation in any respect, the Board, after giving Respondent
Patel notice and an opportunity to be heard, may revoke probation and carry out the disciplinary
order that was stayed. If a Petition to Revoke Probation or an Accusation is filed against
Respondent Patel during probation, the Board shall have continuing jurisdiction and the period of
probation shall be automatically extended until the Petition to Revoke Probation or Accusation is
heard and decided and the charges and allegations in First Amended Accusation No. 6232 shall
be deemed true and correct.

#### Completion of Probation

Upon written notice by the Board or its designee indicating successful completion of
probation, Respondent Patel's license will be fully restored.

#### 14. **Remedial Education**

Within sixty (60) days of the effective date of this decision, Respondent Patel shall submit 18 19 to the Board or its designee, for prior approval, an appropriate program of remedial education related to pharmacy operations, pharmacy law, corresponding responsibility, and the role of a 2021 Pharmacist in Charge (PIC). The program of remedial education shall consist of at least 10 hours per year, of which 50 percent must be live webinar or in-person, and shall be completed at 22 Respondent Patel's own expense. All remedial education shall be in addition to, and shall not be 23 24 credited toward, continuing education (CE) courses used for license renewal purposes for pharmacists. 25

Failure to timely submit for approval or complete the approved remedial education shall be considered a violation of probation. The period of probation will be automatically extended until

such remedial education is successfully completed and written proof, in a form acceptable to the
Board, is provided to the Board or its designee. Following the completion of each course, the
Board or its designee may require Respondent Patel, at his own expense, to take an approved
examination to test his knowledge of the course. If Respondent Patel does not achieve a passing
score on the examination, that course shall not count towards satisfaction of this term.
Respondent Patel shall take another course approved by the Board in the same subject area.

### 15. Ethics Course

Within sixty (60) calendar days of the effective date of this decision, Respondent Patel shall 8 9 enroll in a course in ethics, at his own expense, approved in advance by the Board or its designee, that complies with Title 16 California Code of Regulations section 1773.5. Respondent Patel 10 shall provide proof of enrollment upon request. Within five (5) days of completion, Respondent 11 Patel shall submit a copy of the certificate of completion to the Board or its designee. Failure to 12 timely enroll in an approved ethics course, to initiate the course during the first year of probation, 13 14 to successfully complete it before the end of the second year of probation, or to timely submit proof of completion to the Board or its designee, shall be considered a violation of probation. 15

#### No New Ownership or Management of Licensed Premises

Respondent Patel shall not acquire any new ownership, legal or beneficial interest nor serve 17 as a manager, administrator, member, officer, director, trustee, associate, or partner of any 18 19 additional business, firm, partnership, or corporation licensed by the Board for a period of three (3) years from the effective date of this decision. If Respondent Patel currently owns or has any 20legal or beneficial interest in, or serves as a manager, administrator, member, officer, director, 21 trustee, associate, or partner of any business, firm, partnership, or corporation currently or 22 hereinafter licensed by the Board, Respondent Patel may continue to serve in such capacity or 23 24 hold that interest, but only to the extent of that position or interest as of the effective date of this decision. Violation of this restriction shall be considered a violation of the terms of this 25 stipulation and shall constitute unprofessional conduct and grounds for further disciplinary action. 26 /// 27

4	I have carefully read the above Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order and have fully

53. Alameda Health System (AHS) is a public health care system with several hospitals and wellness centers in Alameda County. Many of AHS's patients filled their prescriptions at Fruitvale Pharmacy until October 2015, when AHS added a special HIV prescription service. At that point, many AHS patients who had previously used Fruitvale Pharmacy transferred their prescriptions to AHS.

54. Between November 2015 and February 2016, AHS personnel, including Dr. AS, filed 9 complaints with the Board against Respondent Fruitvale. AHS personnel noticed that Fruitvale 10 Pharmacy had been refilling prescriptions from AHS without authorization from AHS physicians, 11 that Fruitvale Pharmacy was refusing to fill prescriptions for patients if they did not have all of 12 their prescriptions filled at Fruitvale Pharmacy, that Fruitvale Pharmacy was continuing to fill 13 14 prescriptions after discontinuation notices had been sent to the pharmacy, that an individual from Fruitvale Pharmacy was contacting patients who decided to switch pharmacies and asking them 15 why, and that Fruitvale Pharmacy was continuing to fill prescriptions for patients who had 16 informed Fruitvale Pharmacy that they wished to use a different pharmacy. 17 After receiving these complaints, the Board inspected Fruitvale Pharmacy twice on 55. 18 March 22, 2016, and February 15, 2017. The Board's inspectors spoke with the pharmacists, 19 collected documents, reviewed Respondent Fruitvale's policies and procedures, and spoke with 2021 other personnel.

were for large quantities of controlled substances. As a result of this action, Fruitvale Pharmacy
surrendered its pharmacy permit and Esomonu surrendered his pharmacist license. The
surrenders became effective on July 8, 2015. Respondent Patel purchased Fruitvale Pharmacy's
business and he obtained a new pharmacy permit. Fruitvale Pharmacy operated during the time
relevant to the charges brought in this Accusation.</sup> 

Respondent Fruitvale to discontinue medications and that some of these patients also submitted
 consent forms to Respondent Fruitvale indicating that they wished to fulfill their prescriptions at
 other pharmacies. Despite receiving these notifications, Respondent Fruitvale continued to fill
 and dispense prescriptions for approximately 14 patients.

The inspectors discovered that between January 1, 2015, and December 31, 2016, 57. 5 Respondent Fruitvale refilled prescriptions early for approximately 48 patients by refilling the 6 prescriptions every 24 days instead of on a monthly basis of 30-31 days. This resulted in patients 7 8 receiving 14 or 15 refills per year, an excessive amount of refills beyond the standard 12 monthly 9 refills per year. These prescriptions were for Arithromycin, Atripla, Combivir, Complera, 10 Dapsone, Edurant, Epivir, Epzicom, Intelence, Kaletra, Lantus, Leucovorin, Lexiva, Norvir, Novolog, Prezista, Prochlorperazine, Renagel, Reyataz, Simvastatin, Bactrim DS, Staudine, 11 Stribild, Sustiva, Tivicay, Triumeq, Truvada, and Ziagen. 12

58. The inspectors discovered that between July 8, 2015, and February 15, 2017,Respondent Fruitvale refilled 629 prescriptions from AHS for dangerous drugs even though the

15 refills had not been authorized by the prescriber at AHS.

59. The inspectors discovered that between July 8, 2015, and February 15, 2017,
Respondent Fruitvale had allowed C.E., a previously licensed pharmacist who surrendered his
license after an accusation was filed against him, to work as a pharmacy clerk and to orally take
approximately 33 new prescriptions over the phone. C.E. had previously worked as a licensed
pharmacist at Fruitvale Pharmacy and after he surrendered his license in July 2015, C.E.
continued to work at Fruitvale Pharmacy until some point in 2016.

60. The inspectors discovered that on January 4, 2017; February 2, 2017; and February 4,
2017, Respondent Fruitvale filled three prescriptions for controlled substances even though the
prescriptions did not have the required watermark, the thermochromic ink feature, and a statement
that the prescription would be void if the number of drugs prescribed was not noted. Two
prescriptions were for Norco and methadone, and the third prescription was for fentanyl and
oxycodone.
